

Through its commitment to FSS, OPWDD strongly recognizes the important work performed by families in fostering natural supports that help individuals living at home fully participate in their communities.

Each DDRO also has a Family Support Services Advisory Council to represent the interests of family members and people with developmental disabilities. The councils work in partnership with the DDROs to make decisions supporting families and their loved ones. One of the services asked for most often is respite. Respite services provide temporary relief from the demands of care giving, which helps reduce overall family stress. This often enables them to better meet the needs of a family member with a developmental disability. Respite can be provided in the home or out of the home, during the day, evenings or overnight.





Measure 1: Percent of Infants with Documented Hearing Screening Disposition (as of 1/11/16) 0000-All Hospitals in QIC






Measure 1: Percent of Infants with Documented Hearing Screening Disposition (as of 1/11/16)


Measure 1: Percent of Infants with Documented Hearing Screening Disposition (as of 1/11/16)




Measure 1: Percent of Infants with Documented Hearing Screening Disposition (as of 1/11/16)


Measure 1: Percent of Infants with Documented Hearing Screening Disposition (as of 1/11/16)






Measure 1: Percent of Infants with Documented Hearing Screening Disposition (as of 1/11/16)


Measure 1: Percent of Infants with Documented Hearing Screening Disposition (as of 1/11/16)




