- **Report On New York State's All Payer Database**
The New York State Health Foundation published a report prepared by the APCD Council on the state's All Payer Database that was created through 2011 legislation. The report analyzes some of the issues that have risen during the development of regulations and policies surrounding the APD, and also offers advice to policymakers based on report findings. - **Transforming Clinical Practices Initiative**
The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services recently announced 39 national and regional healthcare networks were recipients of \$685 million dollars through the Transforming Clinical Practices Initiative (TCPI).
